

President's Message

Unless that funny looking little digital puppy ate it, I guess I was just experiencing a sense of digital déjà vu. So, on to my remarks – for what I'm sure is the second time!

The major event since the last newsletter came out was the 2015 GeoFair, at the new venue in Sharonville (OH). I took advantage of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources having a booth there and bought a copy of the revised and expanded second edition of Minerals of Ohio. It is quite well done and, being hard-bound, it will prove to be more durable than the soft-cover 1st edition. GeoFair was well attended and I heard many positive remarks. The only concern that I heard expressed was that the outside swap area would be problematic should there be inclement weather in the future. Speaking of the Swap Area, I want to especially thank our 1st VP, Randy Marsh, and his wife Heather, who made our participation a resounding success! Again, thank you Randy and Heather!

We had an FM membership meeting in the basement of the convention center (Actually, very nice accommodations!) at the end of Saturday. As previously, Terry Huizing generously provided us with a meeting place. While we had a quorum, there was no old business on the agenda, and no formal motions for new business were presented. Our treasurer, Jeff Spencer, gave a treasurer's report, which is supplemented in this newsletter. I read an email from our 2nd VP and field trip chairman, Reggie Rose, regarding his concerns about the large number of people who renew their memberships late. We then spent considerable time discussing the concerns and proposed solutions. Two of the major concerns are the extra work for the treasurer when dues trickle in over an extended period of time, and the uncertainty of eligibility of members who sign up for the first field trip of the season. It seems that the consensus was that we should modify the By-Laws to require that former members be a member in good standing (dues paid) for at least one month before they can attend a field trip. Dues are officially delinquent as of March 1st; so, with the possibility of having a field trip as early as April or May (weather permitting), that may be an impetus for people to pay their dues on time. Consider this an official notice that this action item will be on the agenda for the annual business meeting in early November.

Our funds are held by US Bank. Periodically, I get invitations from them for a credit card. I haven't seen a need for the chapter to have a credit card. Therefore, I routinely tear up the applications and dispose of them. If anyone feels, and can present a good argument as to why we should have a credit card, I'd appreciate hearing from you.

There was a member field trip to Auglaize at the end of May, which Reggie is providing more details on below. He and I have been exchanging email on ways to increase our collecting opportunities and we have some leads that need to be pursued. Lastly, we are having discussions about improving the hazard training that most quarries want, and we have an offer from the safety manager of Jurgensen Aggregates, Tim Renneker, to walk us through putting an MSHA-approved training plan together. Event description & schedule:

On Saturday, July 11, 2015 near Belleville, Ohio you will have a chance to dig for gold through a common dig with the GPAA. A gold catcher or long Tom sluice will be used to wash creek gravel. After sign-up, you will begin digging and panning from 10:00 am until 12:00 pm. Then, there will be a break for a pot luck dinner. If you wish to participate in the pot luck, each participant should bring a dish to share. Bring your own place settings. The pot luck will end at 1:00 pm followed by a GPAA meeting. Digging and panning will resume between 1:45 to 2:00 and last until 4 pm when the gold found will be divided up amongst the participants. There will be 50-50 raffles for nuggets, other specimens and merchandise. A prospectors store with gold equipment, t-shirts, ball caps and other items will be on site. Participants can receive membership kits which are \$80 per year (cheaper than on line) which are good all over the country. If you want to camp, you must seek a sponsor, you can do that by contacting Randy Rowdy.

Other activities:

Following the gold dig, if you have a license, you can fish in the Clear Fork River. Across the road is the Wade & Gatton Nursery if plants interest you. There are 5 motel chains in the Belleville area and a camp ground a mile away. Fast Eddies Pizza delivers monster salads, excellent pizzas, chicken Alfredo and Stromboli. You can also visit Malabar Farms (10 miles away), mid-Ohio Race Track (15 miles away in Lexington, OH), Mohican State Park (hiking and sight-seeing), and one of Ohio's biggest canoe livery's in Loudenville, OH (10 miles away). Also in Loudenville is a grist mill and winery. In Ashland is Mitchell's winery and Fins feathers and Furs, an outdoor sporting goods supplier. The best ice cream and milk in the area is in Wooster, at Hartzlers Dairy.

Report on GeoFair 2015

A new show venue and perfect weekend weather are believed to go hand-in-hand with poor attendance; but this did NOT happen at Cincinnati's GeoFair 2015 the first weekend in May. Paid attendance was up a robust 12% over last year, and approximately 3,500 folks enjoyed a great experience at the modern Sharonville Convention Center.

This regional show, now in its 51st year, is organized by members of the Cincinnati Mineral Society, and the Dry Dredgers (the local paleontological society) to provide a balance between the commercial and educational aspects of the show. For example: 70 educational exhibits from museums, universities, and private collections were presented, some to the theme of *America's Mineral and Fossil Treasures*; four illustrated talks on minerals and fossils were given to over 200 attendees, and in addition the Friends of Mineralogy held a regional meeting at the show. On the commercial side, 50 retail and wholesale dealers participated with reported good results, and a busy "swap" area (where script is used) pumped thousands of dollars back to dealers and educational organizations.

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AUGLAIZE 2015: I WANNA BE LIKE MIKE

In February 1991, Gatorade worked out a deal with the then 28 year old Michael Jordan to have him in what turned out to be the most iconic sports advertisement in history. The deal for Jordan worked out to \$13.5 million for ten years. The catch phrase in the Jordan Gatorade commercial was "I wanna be like Mike."

What does Michael Jordan and his Gatorade commercial have to do with collecting minerals at Auglaize Quarry? Keep reading.

On Saturday May 30, 2015, a full complement of 36 FM collectors journeyed to Auglaize to try their luck. As it turned out, the usual suspects, calcite, fluorite and sphalerite were present. Jay Medici showed us a neat brown, iridescent fluorite and a pretty nice single black sphalerite crystal about the size of your little fingernail. I did also see a smaller amber colored one. Jay also showed us small oval fluorite vugs about the diameter of your finger, some filled with purple fluorite, and some with brown iridescent fluorite. Calcite was common, most of it was rhombohedral, although a few scalenohedrons were seen. Most of what I saw collected was small but pretty, and although the day started out hazy, it became a warm, sunny, pleasant spring day, ideal for collecting.

Hmmm. . . . still the analogy to MJ is not yet drawn. Keep reading.

We have a lot of highly skilled collectors in our FM chapter, but on what was a warm day for most of us, it was a little warmer for a couple of our guys that you all know really well. This warm day at Auglaize was a good day if your name was Mike. Mike who, may you ask? Well, Mike Royal and Mike Scaglione. Surprised? Probably not. Although Auglaize did not yield the whopper fluorites of the past, Mike & Mike found some purple. Last year Mike S. cranked out a piece which had several purple fluorites on it over ½" on a side (I just hope it makes this newsletter edition so you can all drool over this find).

If I am lacking photos for field trip report I can always go to Mike & Mike, and quite often they come to me. They recognize that it is important to share with others what they find. Because they volunteer to have their specimens photographed, it seems like they get more press than most of us.

Back to Mike and Mike. More often than not, it is good to be them

on any given field trip. Though their skill is not unique, (quite a few of you are highly-skilled collectors) it is

special. Not only do Mike and Mike see more than the average collector, they also possess the skill and are willing to do the hard work to extract the special pieces they see. On this day at Auglaize, Mike Royal came up with a fluorite specimen with a cube nearly 3/8" on a side. So did Make Scaglione. Although he found it last year, (he recently finished prepping it and I hope it makes this edition) he showed us a specimen with purple fluorites over ½" on a side. Mike Scaglione's 2014 Auglaize fluorite could have made the cover of Dr. Carlson's Minerals of Ohio book.

Either of the Mike's can probably give you pointers on how to extract a specimen from a boulder. Extracting specimens is a learned skill and they have learned that very well. But their eye to spot top specimens is innate, not developed. They have a great eye – unfortunately, I do not think that a great eye can be taught. If it can, please someone teach us how this is done at one of our symposiums.

What does this have to do with Michael Jordan? Well, if you look at Mike and Mike's specimens over time, you too will "wanna be like Mike".

Postscript: this is to all members on trips. Tom Bolka, our newsletter editor is happy fellow when he can feature your specimens from one of our trips. We have an outstanding newsletter. Part of what makes it outstanding is photos of what you collect on trips. Though you may not become rich and famous from submitting photos of what you collect, you will be exposing your fellow members to the beauty of minerals. So if there's time inside the quarry, please show me what you have found. If we are too busy inside the quarry, let's meet outside the gate after the field trip and take some pictures.
