President's Message - Impressions of the 2017 Tucson Gem & Mineral Show

My first experience with the TG&M Show was as a graduate student at the University of Arizona in the 1970s, when it was held under the grandstands of the rodeo grounds! I've had the privilege over the subsequent decades to attend the show occasionally as it grew up and became an international event. This year, I was unable to arrive before the show opened on Thursday so unfortunately I could not scour the hundreds of motel rooms around town full of mineral dealers the two weeks before the TG&M Show opens. That alone is an experience of a lifetime. However, the 4-day show itself has much to justify the time and expense of visiting this part of the Southwestern US desert in February.

The show theme this year for exhibits and illustrated lectures was "Mineral Treasures of the Midwest". The price of admission allows hours of looking at world-class displays and thousands of minerals of all sizes (and prices) for sale. The Friends of Mineralogy case was excellent and a photo of it appears on page 10. Some of the dealers on the main floor now have prices on their museum-quality specimens in custom display cases marked "POR". Which means "price on request" and I took that to mean if you have to ask, you can't afford it! Fortunately, there is no charge for "window shopping". None-the-less, there is a lot at the Tucson Show for mineral enthusiasts with small bank rolls. Free options include the illustrated talks given on mineralogical topics at the Arthur Roe Micromount Symposium in addition to the Symposium on Midwest Minerals co-sponsored by Friends of Mineralogy. As an example, Terry Huising gave an excellent talk with photos from his article in *Rocks & Minerals* (January/February 2017 co-authored with Pete Richards, Janet Clifford and Robert Cook) on Midwest calcites. Some of the illustrated specimens were on display in Terry's guest exhibit case (my apologies, photography through glass is an art that I have not fully mastered). If you have not read this article with excellent color photos — do so as soon as you can. (Did you notice the leaning scalenohedron in the photo below? Someone probably accidently bumped the case.)

There was an impressive guest exhibit with specimens from the 2006 fluorite pockets found at Clay Center by Gene Novotny and Gail Deck. Brown fluorite has never looked so good! The cubes perched among celestine spears are awesome.





I was surprised by the guest exhibit of the Natural History Museum, London (England) that compared the Midlands minerals of the United Kingdom to those of the US Midwest. Visually identical specimens of copper, calcite, fluorite and quartz from the two quite distant regions placed side-by-side persuasively proved the exhibit's theme.





Even some Arizona institutional collections contained good quality Midwest minerals. The next photo shows specimens from the Flagg Foundation.



There were fabulous exhibits of copper specimens from the Upper Peninsula of Michigan (no photos), fluorites from southern Illinois (Jim Gebel) and the world, and minerals of the Tri-State district (Colorado School of Mines). You could spend an hour at each case pondering the details of crystal morphology, color and associated species.

Treasurer's Report

2/15/17

2016 Annual Report-unaudited

The Midwest Chapter began 2016 with \$4092.81 in our treasury. This included \$870.00 in 2016 dues paid in 2015. At year-end 2016, we had 115 members, up 4 from 2015. Twenty three new members signed up and 19 members from 2015 did not re-register. \$1440.00 in 2016 dues and \$740.00 in 2017 dues were collected in 2016 for a total of \$2180.00. As of 12/31/2016, 37 members had registered for 2017.

An additional income of \$1190.00 was generated through donations at the symposium, the Cincinnati Show swap table, the Agate Association Auction and other fund-raising efforts. The registration form for 2017 was updated to allow registering members to make additional donations for the Symposium or the general treasury. This yielded \$150.00 for the symposium and \$40.00 for the general fund.

Total income for 2016 was \$3370.00.

The Chapter had \$1934.08 in expenses during 2016. This included symposium expenses (\$641.50), a 2- year payment for domain registration and hosting for the new website (\$166.42), insurance (\$650.00), fund-raising expenses (\$37.00) and National dues (\$440.00). Fifty dollars in additional dues payments (including \$38.00 for previous years) was sent to National, but the checks were not cashed until 2017.

This yielded a surplus of \$1435.08 for 2016, and a total year-end balance of \$5,527.89.

2017 Interim Report

An additional 41 members (including 3 new members) have registered in 2017 yielding \$820.00. Ninety dollars in donations for the symposium were received and \$60.00 for the general treasury. Total income so far in 2017 is \$970.00.

After reviewing all the chapter records and reviewing Federal and State codes, I determined that we were not in compliance and had never filed the required documentation with either the State or Federal authorities. We had never filed for or received an official 501-3(c) letter of exemption. With the Board's authorization, I filed the exemption request and paid the \$275.00 filing fee. We received our official exemption Feb. 10th. I was then able to file our required 2016 990-B with the IRS and provide the exemption letter and 2016 annual report to the Ohio Attorney General.


Other expenses paid this year include 2017 National dues for 76 members (\$304.00), newsletter expenses (\$66.61), Checks to National from 2016 that were not cashed until recently (\$50.00) and officer business cards and swap table registration (\$118.70). Total expenses for 2017 so far are \$814.31. This puts our current balance at \$5683.58. Significant budgeted expenses for the remainder of the year are our insurance payment of \$650.00 and the Symposium, for which we have budgeted \$1000.00.

Stan grew up near Ashland Ohio and received his Geology degree at The Ohio State University before relocating to Tucson. In sharp contrast to Tucson, the prices were quite reasonable. Bob Harmon, historical President of the Chapter, donated some of his Indiana geodes to the museum. These are now on permanent display."
