FIELD TRIP TO DOE RUN LEAD MINES

Viburnum, Missouri

Friday, August 10 8:00 am at the Mine Office

Additional collecting and mineral museum tours on Saturday the 11th and Sunday the 12th in the Old Lead Belt area just east and northeast of the Viburnum area.

This exciting Field Trip into Doe Run Mine of the famous Viburnum Trend has been arranged by chapter member Bob Hartup who has contacts through his work in the lead and battery industries. Needless to say, this trip is a rare opportunity for us to go underground in the world's most productive lead region. The mine operators have tailored the visit for us to include underground collecting. Most of the ore is massive galena, but we may find crystals as well.

In addition to the scheduled mine trip, there are plenty of above-ground things to see in the Old Lead Belt area of Missouri. Rich Eddy has explored the Old Lead area and the nearby Pilot Knob iron mine, and has information on surface collecting, historical mining sites, a Civil War battlefield, and the mineral museum at the Missouri Mines State Historical Site. He will be happy to arrange outings with those who arrive for the Doe Run tour for an "extended" field trip.

- Don Schuder reported on some field trips he led in Michigan's Copper Country just prior to the Red Metal Retreat in Houghton, Michigan. A number of chapter members and friends from Indiana, Wisconsin, and Michigan joined Don for field trips to copper mines and agate/thomsonite beaches. This was a nice additional experience for those who made the long trip north to the Keweenaw.
- The Red Metal Retreat also was a success. The auction raised over \$1,000 to benefit the Seaman Mineral Museum at Michigan Tech in Houghton. ABOUT THE MINE

DOE RUN CO. IS THE COMPOSITE OF TWO SMALL LEAD COMPANIES WITH THE OLD ST. FOE LEAD GROUP. DOE RUN OPERATES 6 MINES IN THIS WORLD CLASS MINING AREA. NEARLY 90% OF THE WORLDS LEAD COMES FROM THIS AREA, AND 60% OF IT COMES FROM THE TWO MINES WE WILL BE SEEING.

ASARCO AND COMINCO ALSO OPERATE MINES (A TOTAL OF THREE) IN THE AREA.

THE MINES WE WILL SEE RANGE FROM 400 TO 1100 FEET DEEP AND OVER 6 MILES LONG UNDER GROUND. THE MINE TEMPERATURE IS 55 TO 60 DEGREES AND FOR THE MOST PART DRY.

MAJOR GEOLOGICAL FORMATION

THE VIBURNUM TREND IS THE ORE BODY FOR THE WHOLE AREA. THE COMPANY GEOLOGIST WILL TELL YOU ABOUT IT DURING THE VISIT.

MINERALS IN THE AREA OF THE MINE

MOST OF THE MINERAL DEPOSITS ARE MASSIVE, NEARLY ALL MINES ARE THIS WAY. CRYSTALS ARE RARE, BUT THEY ARE THERE! THE MOST LIKELY ONES ARE: CALCITE, COCHALCITE, PYRITE, GALENA, SPALLERITE, QUARTZ, QUARZTZITE, JAMESONITE, AND CALCOPYRITE. SOME OTHERS HAVE BEEN FOUND ON OCCASION.



MISSOURI MINES STATE HISTORIC SITE

DEDICATION AND OPENING

On Sunday, May 8, 1988, Missouri Mines State Historic Site, Flat River, will be dedicated and opened to the public as the newest of Missouri's 73 state parks and historic sites operated by the Department of Natural Resources.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION AND HISTORY

For many decades the Old Lead Belt, centered around Flat River, was the world's leading producer of lead ore. Ever the years many companies were involved in the mining activities with the St. Joe Lead Company surviving all of them.

Federal Mill No. 3 was constructed by the Federal Lead Company in 1906-07 in Flat River as a lead ore concentrating plant. In 1923 the Mill was purchased by the St. Joe Lead Company and in 1925 Shaft No. 17 was dug here (the only one in the Old Lead Belt dug from the bottom up) primarily to hoist ore from an underground collecting point.

On October 1, 1972, all mining activity ceased in the Old Lead Belt. The deep shafts are sealed. In 1976 the State of Missouri accepted the gift of 8,500 acres of land, including the Mill, from the St. Joe Minerals Corporation. The property became St. Joe State Park. In November, 1980, the Mill complex was separated from the Park and became Missouri Mines State Historic Site.

MUSEUM

The Power House has been converted to a museum of minerals, mineral resources, and mining history and technology. One large gallery exhibits 12 large pieces of underground mining equipment including one of the 52 famous St. Joe Shovels and a 15 ton mainline locomotive. A second gallery deals with the State's geology, mineral resources and minerals of Missouri and the world. A third gallery is under development and will deal with the history and technology of the various mining industries in Missouri. Mining films are shown on schedule.

The Museum Shop offers for sale related books, rockhound equipment, mineral jewelry and other materials.

MUSEUM SOCIETY

The Missouri Mines Museum Society is an incorporated not-for-profit support group of interested individuals and families. Members enjoy free admission with guest privileges and a discount at the Museum Shop. New members welcome.

THE SITE

Surface tours of the site will show the milling process. Detailed plans have been made to restore certain structures.
