"THE VREELAND SPECTROSCOPE - ITS
USE IN MINERAL IDENTIFICATION"

The atoms of the mineral get so hot their electrons jump to higher energy states. The electrons eventually return to their orbits, giving up the energy that had knocked them loose. Much of this energy is visible light and the colors of light correspond to the amount of energy given up.

Each element produces distinctive colors in this way. By comparing the colors given off by a sample with charts in the spectroscope that show the lines of different colors produced by known elements, one may identify the elements in the sample and use this knowledge, together with other physical properties of the mineral, to identify the mineral.

At the business meeting that follows my demonstration we will continue the discussion on the topic of using some of our club funds for educational activities (see the minutes of the January meeting, next page). Please come to the meeting; we need your views on this subject.
