Presidents Patter

Sorry I missed such an educational and interesting meeting with Ur. John Medici on the "Fluorites of Ohio", but as you know I was in

Oaxaca, Mexico, for a few days.

The only major minerals I saw was the predominance of pure jade or jadeite. Many of the Zapotec Indians around Monte Alban ruins are peddling masks and figures carved from beautiful blue/green jade or jadeite. They were also trying to sell archaeological fragments they say were found in the surrounding fields. Purchasing such items could mean difficulties for the traveller passing through customs. I did buy a beautiful hand-carved jadeite mask from one of the local indians. Many of these natives are wonderful craftspersons-weavers, potters, and stone sculptors.

The city of Oaxaca, at an altitude of 5000 feet, is situated in a valley surrounded by mountains and old volcanoes. Its history extends from 1500 BC to the present. The major interest today is the ruins of Monte Alban and Mitla, developed by the Zapotec Indians from AD 500 to 1000, abandoned to the Mixtec Indians who in turn were conquered by the Spanish in 1529. The Spanish name for the area was Antiquares, but the Zapotec Indian name of Oaxaca was

later adopted.

Oaxaca was one of the most godly towns in New Spain. The first convent was established in 1529 only eight years after the conquest. In twenty years the first friars built 160 churches in as many villages.

Monte Alban ruins were discovered and excavated by Dr. Alfonso Casa in 1932. I could present a program to the club if there is interest.

"MINERAL NEWS"

Hal Roepke passed along a copy of the January '95 issue of the "Mineral News". He thought we would be interested in new data on minerals.

The Mineral Collector's Newsletter contains 12 pages (8.5"x11")of up-to-date mineral news, photographs, conference reports, recent discoveries and book reviews.

One interesting article by Art Smith of Houston, Texas, concerns "corrections and new information" on included quartz from Arkansas. At the 1994 Tucson Show, Art Smith noticed some Arkansas Quartz with inclusions of Galena crystals offered for sale. He felt that the location where these crystals were claimed to be found was incorrectly identified.

Several months later, following considerable investigation, he identified the correct location as coming from a mine in Saline County known as the Green Crystal Mine.

These Arkansas crystals are apparently unique -containing inclusions of Cookeite, Arkerite and minute gas bubbles, which are extremely attractive.

The complete article is too long to be detailed here. Hopefully this brief sketch will wet your appetite for further study. I will have my
