Earl Pope has submitted the following announcement regarding a new issue of mineralogical stamps. I'm sure you will want to stock up when they become available in mid-September.

SNEAK PREVIEW

The last time it was possible to send off a letter with a U.S. mineral stamp on it, the stamp would have cost you just 10c. That was in the mid 1970s, when the U.S. Postal Service issued its first four mineral heritage stamps, featuring amethyst, rhodochrosite, tourmaline, and petrified wood. Lillian Turner, Chairman of the

Commemorative Stamp Committee of the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS), fought 10 years to see the first stamps printed and has worked tirelessly over the past 18 years — along with Wendell Mohr and others on the committee — to see a second set of four finally become a reality

The official unveiling of the new mineral stamps is set for July 23 at the AFMS National Show in Brunswick, Ohio Assistant Postmaster General Gordon Morison plans to attend The U.S. Postal Service is scheduled to release the stamps September 17 in Washington, D.C., at the National Museum of Natural History. You may obtain a first day cover at your local post office starting September 18. It is Postal Service policy to sell commemorative issues for 60 days, but nuneral enthusiasts have been waiting 18 years for these, so mark your calendar and when September 18 rolls around, don't delay. Another way to get your commemorative mineral stamps is to send a self-addressed envelope along with instructions about num-



ber and combination of stamps, and a check or money order (made out to the U.S. Postal Service) to: Customer Affixed Envelope, Mineral Stamps, Postmaster 900, Brentwood Road, N.W., Washington, DC 20066-9991. But wait till September or your request may get lost.

Have Lillian Turner and the AFMS started working on the next set of mineral stamps? "There are *more* than eight minerals in the U.S.," Turner says. Here's hoping it doesn't take as long for the rest of them to get the stamp of approval from the U.S. Postal Service.

Just in case you have misplaced your copy of the membership application information, I am enclosing another copy for you to share with the mineral enthusiasts in your neighborhood; round up a passel of new members, take 'em out on one of our collecting trips with you and share your interests with those who haven't yet discovered the beauty of mineral crystals!

If you come across a newspaper or magazine article or cartoon, or an announcement of a mineralogical/geological/environmental meeting or political action that could affect or be of interest to FRIENDS of MINERALOGY or its members, please feel that your contribution would be welcome.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE INDIANA CHAPTER

HISTORY: The Indiana Chapter of the Friends of Mineralogy, Inc. was formed in January of 1987, and has been active since then in promoting interest in minerals, focusing primarily, but not exclusively, on the mineralogy of Indiana and its neighboring states. The Chapter is chartered by the national Friends of Mineralogy, is incorporated by the State of Indiana, and is a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) educational and scientific organization, with about 40 paid members as of June, 1992.

PURPOSES:

- 1. To promote interest in and knowledge of mineralogy.
- 2. To advance mineralogical education.
- 3. To protect and preserve mineral specimens and promote conservation of mineral localities.
- 4. To further cooperation between amateur and professional and encourage collection of minerals for educational value.
- 5. To support publications about mineralogy and about the programs of kindred organizations.

<u>MEMBERSHIP</u>: Open to any person regardless of residence or level of knowledge about minerals. Current members come from six states, and include both professionals and amateurs. Members also belong to the national organization of Friends of Mineralogy.

MEETINGS: Held 6 times a year at the Indiana State Museum, 202 N. Alabama St., Indianapolis, or at various mineral shows in the area. Meetings are open to the general public, and are free of charge.

FIELD TRIPS: To area mines and quarries. Participation is limited to members of our Chapter, to members of other FM chapters, and on a one-time introductory basis, to prospective members. The Chapter carries liability insurance.




