surfaces on which the distribution of electrical charges can control the shapes of organic molecules that come in contact with the crystals. The linking together of organic molecules on the crystals creates more complex molecules of the kind that make up parts of DNA and RNA, and may have defined the fundamental biological units that have in the meantime (the last 3,500,000,000 years or so) combined in the various patterns that distinguish different forms of life. WOW! Maybe our love of crystals is genetic! I'll never look at a pyrite crystal in quite the same way again.... Is that you, Gramma?


