MINUTES - SEPTEMBER 11, 1993

Nelson Shaffer suggested a future "Minerals of the Midwest" symposium, possibly at the Cincinnati Gem & Mineral Show, to fulfill the public education part of our charter. This topic will be discussed further at the November meeting.

Pennsylvania Chapter, Friends of Mineralogy - Fall Symposium 1993 a report by Sylvia Sicree

Al and I decided to attend this years PA-F.O.M. symposium and see what our neighboring organization was doing. This decision was helped, not a little, by the fact that our son, Andrew, is curator of the Penn State Earth and Mineral Sciences Museum where the symposium was being hosted.

Friday night was an open house and social at the Museum. Everyone could spend as much time as he wanted examining the minerals, exhibits and large collection of mineral art.

Saturday we started bright and early with coffee and donuts at 8:00. After an introduction by Andrew Sicree, the talks began. We heard:

Dr. David P. Gold = The Habitat of Diamonds

Chuma Mbalu-Keswa = Mineralogy of Tanoma Kimberlites, PA

Heyward Wharton = The Viburnum Trend Lead-Zinc Ore Discovery

Dr. Deane Smith = Genth Collection of Penn State

Marcelle Weber = Mineralogy of Mont St. Hillaire

After the speakers, there was a mineral auction to benefit the Friends of Mineralogy Grant Fund. We won the bid on a field trip manual for New York State and found ourselves sitting next to the author!

Next there were optional tours of the geology department and laboratories.

Dinner was a banquet at the Atherton Hilton. After the food we were treated to another speaker - Richard Bostwick - who talked about the Franklin-Sterling Hill District.

If you think our heads were spinning from all this information - it's true. After dreaming all night about beautiful minerals, we met at 8 Sunday morning in the cold wet rain. We were provided with a very detailed field trip guidebook with maps, mileage and geology for the whole day. And the rain stopped!

We started with the Graysdale Pit of the Scotia Iron mines. Pieces of iron ores were still scattered around the old dumps. Next was the Blair Clay Pit. Initially mined for iron ore, then clay, we found huge piles of bauxite still there. Then we walked along a busy railroad to view a thrust fault known as the "Birmingham Window". During our entire drive our guide book explained in great detail the geology which was passing by our car window and at the stops our leader was very knowledgeable and patiently answered all our questions.

Last of all, we came to the New Enterprise Quarry at Roaring Spring, site of an overturned anticline. Many minerals have been reported there, but coming from Ohio, it was hard for us to get excited about fluorite which looked like purple dust! However, we did find clusters of wafer-thin calcites and some dolomites. Al even found a rock where the calcite was "slicked" by rock fault movement and a tiny purple fluorite was sitting in the white calcite. Best of all were the white balls of strontianite which upon magnification looked like prickly spheres of sharp white needles. We were allowed to collect until 5 p.m. and by then, we were exhausted.

The PA group has been doing this for many years and they put together a good collection of speakers and a highly educational field trip. We hope to be able to go back again next year.
