PRESIDENT'S PATTER

I must apologize for mis-using the word "lawsuit" noted in Tim Greeman's minutes in our last newsletter. Tim picked up the term from some comments I made at our Richmond meeting on the Mineral Index discussion held in Tucson. It has been pointed out to me, there is still an ongoing dialogue between the various concerned parties. Again my apologies for any inconvenience in my interpretation of the discussion.

Last month while searching for a subject for the newsletter, Vern Swanson, known to many of you, suggested something on gold and diamonds in Indiana. As it turned out I did not need the material for the last letter, but will use it for this one.

Checking our Indiana State Museum minerals, I found a few flakes of gold embedded in a plastic block, but alas no diamonds. Even at today's gold prices the ISM collection would not make anyone rich. One might buy a cup of coffee at best.

In our natural history library we found two articles on the subject of gold and diamonds. One a september 1989 article from the "Gold Prospector", written by Micheal Paul Henson. Another in an excellent old publication written by W.S. Blatchley, one of Indiana's well known naturalists and former state geologist.

Canada and the glaciers receive credit for any gold or diamonds found in the state, as gold is not typically mined in Indiana. Gold found is of the "placer" type sifted from some of the black sand areas of streams and creek beds.

Brown and Morgan counties, south of Indianapolis can claim to be the most likely areas for a little gold panning. At least 15 other counties are also listed as possibilities for some gold and diamonds.

The Blatchley article consists of some 50 pages and goes into considerable detail on gold localities with appropriate maps. While the written material is old, I expect some gold could be found today if one should try working a couple of the known stream beds.

Diamonds, are not as well know but the Brown and Morgan counties are again listed as possible locations. Small diamonds might be found by the gold seekers, but diamonds of three and four carats have also been reported.

Perhaps we could find a speaker for one of our meetings who has prospected these areas. With some first-hand knowledge, a field trip could be an exciting experience sometime.
