

MINUTES OF MEETING-JANUARY 14, 2001

January 14, 2001, meeting of the Midwest Chapter of the Friends of Mineralogy was held at the Indiana State Museum in Indianapolis, Indiana. Twelve members were in attendance.

The treasurer reported that the checking account balance as of December 31, 2001, was \$244.22. As of the meeting date, the club's assets totaled \$540.22.

Old Business: President Edington made a motion that the slate of candidates for 2001 officers as published in the January issue of the newsletter be accepted. The motion was seconded and approved by the members present.

New Business: Nelson Shaffer will be the Midwest Chapter representative to the board of the National Friends of Mineralogy.

Henry Barwood spoke on the need to publicize the activities of the chapter. Newsletters should be sent to other FoM chapters. Information on the Midwest Mineral Symposium should be sent to the editor of the national newsletter.

The chapter should emphasize mineralogical education. This could take the form of compiling mineral locality information as well as current information on the existence of significant mineral collections which could be accessed by the public or by restricted groups of interested persons.

The meeting was adjourned.

Dr. Jeff Swopes, Associate Professor of Geology at IUPUI in Indianapolis, gave a presentation with slides on sheet silicate mineralogy. Dr. Swopes discussed recent research findings on the effects of included chlorine and fluorine atoms on the structure of micas. The presentation was particularly interesting in that it included observations and conclusions from his own research in that area.


