

NOTES ON GREENFIELD MEETING

I am an inveterate collector. I started with stamps at about 7 years of age and by the mid 1990's, I sold my collection for a considerable sum. About 15 years ago I became seriously interested in minerals and shortly thereafter narrowed my collecting focus to geodes and Indiana minerals. Beside field collecting, I subscribed to publications and joined clubs and societies. And I started going to rock shows. First there were local shows, then national shows including Denver, Springfield, and of course the Tucson show. Attending each national show is connected with a vacation and family trip to make the whole experience worthwhile and satisfy my wife who always accompanies me. I have now been to Tucson about 6 times in the last 11 years. Each of you should try and go, staying in Arizona for a week or two in February; it is a real experience!

I assume that the majority of Midwest Chapter FoM members are rock collectors that, like me, have progressed past the "youngster" or "casual" collector stage. We belong to the clubs and societies and subscribe to various periodicals and we attend shows. Most members have bought, or thought of buying, specimens to enhance their collections. So how many of us are there???? Younger casual

collectors have probably decreased in numbers as local collecting sites have closed and many other interests have taken over. But I am primarily interested in adult more or less serious collectors; those that actively pursue the hobby like us. Those that spend some time and, perhaps, a bit of money on it. Those adults that, when asked about a hobby, willingly state that "mineral collecting" is their interest.

This question of numbers can be looked at in many ways. Many of us just enjoy field collecting and the comeraderie of friends with similar interests. Others have the financial resources to also enhance their collections with purchased specimens. And of those that spend money on rocks is it an occasional small amount or a regular serious amount, which can easily run into four or five figure amounts. So, again, how many of each category are we?

I don't propose to give actual numbers, although, in the past, attempts were made to do this. I will give my thoughts thru some generalizations and estimates. As I have already stated, I believe casual collecting by youngsters and teenagers is less, perhaps much less, than in years past. I also believe casual adult collector numbers that "only occasionally" spend a "little time" with our hobby is probably down over the past number of years. And this does not include lapidary arts, crafts etc etc; just mineral collecting. Looking at publication figures of 3 hobby periodicals finds their circulation numbers somewhat down over the past few years. But the most interesting number, to me, is the "serious collector" number. Those who regularly spend both time and money, sometimes substantial money, on their collection. Those that buy mounts, expensive home cabinetry and travel and exhibit; those numbers are up and rising. Not only in the U.S., but in Europe, Asia, and even in a few areas of Latin America. INCREASING numbers of adults of moderate and higher financial means are spending both time and money on the hobby of mineral collecting. There seems to be an INCREASING number of worldwide serious collectors!!

So I have hope that the long term health of our hobby is ensured.
