#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"What is it worth?" "What is your most valuable or expensive rock/geode??" These are 2 of the most frequently asked questions by both non rock collectors and even some collectors like ourselves when viewing my collection. On the face of it, it seems like a straight forward, easily answered question. "This one is worth \$200 or these couple of geodes are worth about \$400 etc, etc". But not so fast. Answering these questions really is not that simple. Beauty AND VALUE are in the eye of the beholder....sometimes the buyer. How much are you willing to pay for someone else's property....the rock in question.

To non rock collectors the value might only be the intrinsic value of a diamond, gold or silver or other minerals that can be made into jewelry. To a collector it is whatever and how much he wants to pay for the particular specimen. The size, perfection and esthetics of the particular piece in question engender a specific longing and coveting by a potential buyer. For me, a very hi quality Indiana geode would be worth spending more of my money than any specimens from elsewhere. In other words I might write a check out for \$500 for a worthy Indiana geode and not look twice at a similar hi quality Keokuk area geode. This is "pursuing the chase", as only a few perfect or nearly perfect examples of specimens of any type exist. Collectors of varying means pursue this chase and will out bid each other to own the most perfect and greatest example of the species they are most interested in.

Although most collectible rock specimens have some monetary value, from trivial to great, most collectors collect not only for the monetary value, but for the emotional esthetics engendered by appreciating the natural art of mineral crystal specimens. Indeed, collectors of all types including painting, sculpture, stamps, antique furniture, classic cars etc collect primarily out of appreciation of the wonders of man and nature and only secondarily list monetary benefits as their primary reason for collecting. Monetary gain is more properly called INVESTING and primarily not collecting. So art INVESTORS and mineral INVESTORS ACCUMULATE primarily for the monetary gain. While COLLECTORS COLLECT primarily for the esthetics of perfection, they will still spend handsomely to acquire specimens with that perfection.

So if someone viewing your collection asks "What is this rock worth?" Ask that individual "what is it worth TO YOU".....and that is what it is worth! Good hunting!!!!!!!!!
